



There's no better way to see how Texas wines stand up to their international counterparts than in a blind tasting. It removes all preconceptions and puts the wines on a level playing field.

It's fun and there's sure to be a few surprises!

Print the Texas Two Sip-Tasting placemat and the 1. Two-Sip Tasting Sheet. Purchase five Texas wines and five comparable (style 2. and price) international counterparts. Keep the receipt so you have the prices for each wine. Texas Fine Wine offers suggestions from which 3. you can choose. Determine the order of the wines on a master sheet. For example, 1A is a Texas Viognier and 1B is a French Viognier. 2A is an Italian Vermentino and 2B is a Texas Vermentino. And so on. Cover the bottles with brown paper bags or aluminum foil so you can't see labels. Remove the corks as well. Label the bottles to match your master sheet. Ideally, pour the wines before your guests arrive. Hint: Take white wines out of refrigerator 30 minutes before pouring; red wines should be 5. cooled slightly before serving. 6. Smell and taste each set of comparable wines and make notes

on the Texas Two-Sip Tasting Sheet.

After each guest finishes each set of wines, ask your guests which wine they preferred and which wine they believe is Texas.

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Guests are encouraged to record information about each wine on the Two-Sip Tasting Sheet for their records.
